## GFWC Women's Club of Palatka 2018

In a word, how would you describe the GFWC Women's Club of Palatka? I would say, "Community." What is community? There are a couple of definitions of community and both can be exemplified by our Women's Club. We are familiar with the fact that community can refer to a group of people living in the same place or sharing the same characteristics. However, community can also be a feeling of fellowship with others, as a result of sharing common attitudes, interests, and goals. After reviewing a year of narratives, I feel the Women's Club of Palatka is the epitome of community.

We are part of a much larger group of Women's Clubs from district to national. Together, the members of these clubs have accomplished much to better and improve not only those within our borders but internationally as well. While I am proud to be a part of this noble group, it is my local club that I can more fully understand and of which I can speak.

During the past year we have worked together to bring change not only to our local community but also our international community. The work has not been easy and oftentimes was challenging, yet our members were not daunted by the obstacles facing them. It is said there is strength in numbers. Then I say we are few but we are mighty. We have overcome the unexpected challenge of hurricane damage to normal wear and tear suffered by our club house, a local landmark that not only houses our meetings but also provides a space used by our community. Our members have found many ways to raise revenue for this maintenance. Working together, the financial needs have been met resulting in this beautiful example of southern architecture being able to serve our club and the residents of Putnam County for years to come.

I am proud of our club and its members. We have a diversified group with interests in the Arts, History, Public Issues, Public Relations, Home Life, Education, and Conservation. These interests have been "put to work" by the leaders in these areas and the members who have found a place to serve in these groups. Their compassionate concerns and passionate involvement ranged from visiting those in local nursing homes, education and public awareness of domestic violence in our own community, to children in third world countries needing surgery to repair cleft palates or children who might not have anything for Christmas and who might never know Christian love that asks nothing in return.

To the rescue came Operation Smile and Operation Christmas Child. Together, 41 shoeboxes were collected. It was wonderful to be part of this national effort that collected well over 1 million boxes to be shipped overseas. To date, we have managed to collect enough money to fund numerous operations for beautiful smiles – giving us all a reason to smile. Some of these collections were received in traditional ways, face to face with those the members knew or came in contact with or members who saved change and miscellaneous dollar bills (or higher denominations) throughout the month and brought the collections to the luncheons where they were added to the other monies in the account for these surgeries. Yet a surprising amount of

the money raised came from online donations. It was a successful new way (for our club) of reaching out to more people. We are learning more about how to use the Internet to further our Women's Club endeavors.

An ongoing outreach is to the Lee Conlee House, a shelter for abused and battered women and their children. Domestic violence is unfortunately a part of our community as well as others around the world. Our members are not sitting doing nothing about it. Donations of clothing, blankets, toys and other items are collected whenever we are made aware of the need. Part of preventing violence is to be aware of where and how it can happen. Our club sponsored & hosted a self-defense course through the Palatka Police Department who enlisted aid from their own officers as well as local martial arts experts. We reached not only our members but the community from participants to instructors. .At least once a year we have guest speakers from the community who come to our meetings and further educate us on the topic and issues pertaining to domestic violence. Once we have a base of knowledge, we are better equipped to help others in our community. I once read that knowledge is power. Hopefully our outreaches will empower women to escape violent situations and lifestyles that continue to make them victims.

Community within community. It's not just about us...I would say the members of the Women's Club of Palatka have, in the past year, become more of a community within our own club. New members, existing members and candidates for membership are being enlightened as to what our club has to offer them for personal growth and community involvement. I have been a member for several years, always struggling to find a place to belong, an answer to the question, "Why am I member of the Women's Club?" For me, this year has been an exciting journey learning why I am a member, which all began at our annual September Membership Tea. During that tea Mary Powell and Theresa Crocket were invited to give an overview of GFWC and District 4, and our local department chairs were on hand to further share with us the CSP programs and sign-up sheets so we could get started right away before the inspiration fizzled! I had no idea how far reaching the GFWC and our Women's Club is. I found my place to belong and with the help of other members, I am finding more ways to participate. I was able to go beyond the walls of our club house, into the community and involve others in our various projects. I lost track of how many times I heard someone say, "I didn't know the Women's Club does that."

As each member becomes involved and informed, she becomes a Women's Club diplomat in the community. It's in that capacity that we will all grow beyond our current understanding of those around us, the community at large and its needs that together we can meet. As we learn to partner with other Women's Clubs within our county as well as other civic organizations, we are bettering those we reach. As each success is spread abroad into the community, a momentum is gained in public awareness and hopefully expanded membership. Each new member brings with them creative ways to help our club help others. This year we welcomed nineteen new members! We are not large in number, so these nineteen members were quite a boon to our club.

Every month this year has been history in the making. So the details are not lost, documentation for the future has been well noted in newsletters, reports, social media and scrapbooks. Our physical scrapbooks are an amazing collection of our club's history. Our digital recordings of our club's activities aren't shabby either! I am thankful to the ladies who dedicate themselves to the endeavor of preserving the history of our club.

As with any club, the challenge is to make the community in which the club exists aware of who we are and what we do. Events open to the community at large is one way to introduce our club to the public. We have participated in the local Veteran's Day parade, hosted a self-defense class, worked with other clubs in our community, such as the Sunrise Rotary and the Keep Putnam Beautiful organization (a Keep America Beautiful project) for the betterment of our residents. We brought attention to our club with two highly anticipated annual fundraisers. Our smoked pork butts are pre-sold and smoked by a county commissioner (more community involvement) and are so delicious that we always are sold out and people are clamoring for more! Our other annual fundraiser involves a semi-truck filled with five different varieties of azaleas in gallon size pots, which are pre-sold during the year and made available at our club house for pickup the same day as the pork butt sale. We reached beyond our walls into the community, in partnership with our sister clubs in Welaka and Crescent City, in a breast cancer fundraiser that brought in over \$10,000 in locally raised donations. Go ladies and go Putnam County! As a county, we may be economically challenged but the generosity of our residents is beyond measure. We partnered with a local car wash, Sunset Point Car Wash and our members bought \$10.00 tickets for their personal use, for gifting and for selling. Our club kept half the proceeds. We partnered with the Lions Club International in collecting prescription eyeglasses throughout the year which were given to those in need. One collection taken by our president netted two hundred pairs! Talk about the power of partnership!

To be more involved, together as members and in our community, we weekly visited residents in nursing homes, held an evening of free public entertainment in honor of Veterans during our annual Celebrate America Program, and we consistently supported two local theater groups, the River City Players and the newly established Purple Plum Players as well as the Florida School of the Arts and the Palatka High Musical Theater. We had a busy year, as you can read, and time and space do not permit an inclusive list of what the Women's Club of Palatka accomplished in the past year. The value of our members is that we realized our strengths and weaknesses and banded together to make our club's endeavors this past year successful. After all, it is not about us individually, it is about community. It is about the collective giving of ourselves for the benefit of others near and abroad.




